In conjunction with the Day of the Seafarers, the Mission to Seafarers Singapore organized the SafeTALK workshop (Suicide Alertness For Everyone) at our Centre in Jurong Port to raise awareness about suicide prevention on board ships. We are grateful for the collaboration between LivingWorks LivingWorks Australia and The Mission to Seafarers, which made this workshop possible. Thank you to all the 18 participants from Maritime and Port Authority of Singapore (MPA), Singapore Maritime Officers' Union / Wavelink Group, ILSM, and our local staff members for their efforts to equip themselves to handle difficult situations they may encounter while working with seafarers. Asking the question, "Are you thinking of taking your own life?" is not as easy as it may seem. The trainers Cheng Hwee Fern and Catherine Graham gave instruction for the 3.5-hour intensive SafeTALK workshop which provided the attendees with tools to identify a potentially suicidal person using the acronym TALK: Tell, Ask, Listen, and Keep Safe.

As welfare workers, it is vital for us to avoid being the "Hungry Bakers" but instead be well-equipped so that we can effectively support crew members with suicidal thoughts.

Staff Training for Effective Service



In 2024 alone, MtSS transported over 7,000 seafarers, connecting them from their vessels from key locations such as PSA Pasir Panjang, Tuas Mega Port, Jurong Port, Marina South Pier, and West Coast Pier. With the addition of new team members, we are not only increasing our capacity but also ensuring that our services meet the highest safety and operational standards.

To equip our team for this vital mission, all new and existing staff have undergone a comprehensive orientation program conducted by qualified trainers from PSA at their esteemed training institute. We recognize the critical role shore leave plays in supporting the mental health and wellbeing of seafarers. By expanding our team and investing in high-quality training, we aim to make their shore leave as smooth and stress-free as possible. Safety, care, and efficiency remain our top priorities. As we gear up for 2025, MtSS remains dedicated to our mission of caring for the welfare of seafarers who contribute tirelessly to the global economy. With a strengthened team and enhanced training, we are ready to meet the challenges ahead and continue making a positive impact in the lives of the seafaring community.

Tragic Loss on Board

For many seafarers, the moment they step off the gangway and into the arms of their families is unparalleled. After months at sea, they relish the simple pleasures of home: shared meals, family celebrations, and the comfort of familiar surroundings which sometimes we take it for granted. These happy reunions make it worthwhile the sacrifices made during long voyages and highlight their resilience and dedication.

In stark contrast, there are heart-breaking stories of seafarers who tragically lose their lives while at work. The sea, while a source of livelihood, can be unforgiving. Accidents, harsh weather conditions, and health issues can turn a routine voyage into a fatal journey, leaving their families behind, without joyous homecoming, but only the grief of loss and the challenge of moving forward without their loved one.

Our thoughts and prayers go out to all these tragedies casting a shadow over the maritime industry. May the Lord watch over all the seafarers as they sailed across treacherous waters to provide for their families and bring us our necessities to our shore.



Tragic Loss of a Filipino Seafarer on board!

A 40-year-old Filipino seafarer has left an indelible mark on the hearts of all his colleagues. A father of a ten-year-old, he was eagerly anticipating his long-awaited sign off from Singapore and reunion with his family this Christmas after a gruelling 11 months at sea. His wife and child had already decorated the Christmas tree, prepared his favourite dishes and counting down the days until his return.

But fate had other plans. He died on 4th December en-route to Singapore from S. Africa before his scheduled disembarkation. Despite the crew's best efforts to revive him, he passed away in the afternoon. His last conversation with his wife the night before had been filled with hope and promises—plans to watch the Christmas lights together and gifts he had prepared for the child.

The news of his death was a devastating blow to his family, who had been looking forward to welcoming him home. His colleagues on board spoke of his humour, his dedication and the sacrifices he made to give his family a better future. His untimely passing is a stark reminder of the emotional and physical toll life at sea takes on seafarers.

The Mission to Seafarers in SG stepped in to support his grieving colleagues and to give him the farewell he deserves. For seafarers who spend long months away from their loved ones, Christmas is more than a holiday—it is a symbol of reunion, love, and hope. His absence will be deeply felt, not just by his family but by the entire crew on board.



We gathered as a community to pray for the deceased Oiler on board one of the container vessels which came alongside in PSA Pasir Panjang. The somber mood reflected our collective grief and respect for the deceased. Each member of the crew stood in silent reflection, offering prayers and support for one another. The memorial service underscored the strong bonds formed in their shared life at sea, reminding us of the fragility of life and the importance of community. We honored the Oiler's memory, acknowledging his contributions and the void his passing leaves in the surviving crew and their hearts.



We reached out to the crew members of MV Puerto Rosario to remember the passing of their Bosun, Michael Michael had dedicated his life to the sea and many crew who sailed with him. A funeral service was held on board the bulk carrier anchored at EAPA on 23 May 2024 at 1230hrs. Together with the crew members, we honour his memory and prayerfully provide closure for all his shipmates. His courage and spirit will be deeply missed. Rest in peace, Bosun.



Caring for Seafarers around the world is more than words; it is a reflection of our dedication to providing support, comfort, and compassion to uplift those who spend their lives at sea, regardless of race, nationality, or religion.

Yet again a seafarer - this time a Ukrainian - tragically passed away on board his vessel while in China. His crew mates were grieving and desperate to ensure he was given the dignity and respect he deserved in his last journey. The vessel made her way to Singapore en route to Romania for discharging and where the repatriation process would take place.

Recognising the emotional and spiritual needs of the crew, the ship owner alerted us at the Mission for help. We arranged for an Eastern Orthodox priest to board the ship alongside our team. A funeral service was conducted, honouring the seafarer's life and faith. It was a poignant reminder that even in the face of tragedy, no seafarer is alone, and no challenge is too great for us at the Mission to Seafarers to address. Our care transcends all religious boundaries. This is the essence of inclusiveness—the heartbeat of the Mission to Seafarers. Whether a seafarer practices Christianity, Islam, Hinduism, Buddhism, or no religion at all, we stand ready to provide the help they need, when they need it most.

This is a testament that every seafarer is part of one global seafaring family. By caring for their physical, emotional, and spiritual well-being, we honour their immense contribution to the world's economy and daily life.

As we conclude 2024, may this be a reminder of the humanity that unites us all in 2025. Seafarers may be the invisible workforce of the global trade for the common folks on the street, but to us, they are visible, valued, and cherished.
